We get most of our electricity in Iowa from wind AND we pay among the lowest average price for electricity.

- lowa gets 62% of its electricity form wind the highest share of wind generation in the U.S.
- We are among the 10 states with the lowest average electricity prices.

Taxpayers pay less thanks to wind

- Wind projects (and solar projects) make substantial local tax payments. For example, a wind farm in O'Brien County in Northwest lowa pays 8 times more in taxes than the county's next largest taxpayer.
- As a result, O'Brien County's tax rates plummeted from the third highest in the region to the third lowest.

Wind Power is Safe

- Numerous turbines along the path of the tragic Greenfield tornado remained standing. The
 collapse of some turbines after taking a direct hit from the tornado is rare; of the 6,400 wind
 turbines in lowa only a few were damaged by this storm.
- Wind power is not a risk to human health dozens of independent, peer-reviewed studies conducted around the world, including the U.S., have consistently found no evidence that wind farms cause any negative physical health effects.
- Wind power is far less harmful to wildlife than traditional energy sources it displaces, including to birds and their critical habitats. Overall, wind causes less than 0.01% of all human-related bird deaths. Other causes include buildings (550 million), power lines (130 million), cars (80 million), pesticide poisoning, (67 million), and radio and cell towers (6.8 million).
